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An award for a Canadian Instructor at the Bowtech International Conference at Yale University

Bowen without frontiers: a mission to Salvador



Tom Gibbs a former reporter for the BBC invited John Wilks to organize Bowen classes to veterans in El Salvador. John Wilks had already successfully organized similar classes in Bosnia. The idea is to transform killing hands into healing hands. Veterans from the guerilla, veterans from the regular army, social workers, mothers, nuns, anyone interested to learn Bowen, 30 of them gathered in an orphanage. John Wilks taught Module 1-2, Louise Tremblay Module 3-4, Arnina and Kerry Module 5-6. Imagine a woman from the guerilla giving a Bowen treatment to a former soldier who participated in the massacre of her village killing many of her family.

The soldier falls deeply asleep in a rest unavailable to him since before the war with all its horrors inscribe in his body and his soul. With Bowen they learn to heal others and themselves. They are able to offer efficient care to all the people in their community. Bowen becomes a trade and a way to reinsert themselves in their community who has outcaste them.

The program is ongoing. Other class will be held. Not only the instructors are not paid, but also they have to pay their flight and food. The misery and poverty of the Salvadorians are so huge that there is no hesitation to generosity.
